





## Report to members on Conference review - No.2, May 2017

On May 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> 2017 the review process was broadened to invite anyone from any of our churches to participate in an open forum consultation. On the afternoon of May 3rd a specific conversation for Churches of Christ ministers was arranged at Dulwich/Rose Park United Church where 19 ministers were in attendance. On the evenings of May 3<sup>rd</sup> & 4<sup>th</sup> members of congregations from all over Adelaide attended Brighton Church of Christ (76) and Salisbury East Church of Christ (47) respectively.

The objective of this report is to communicate common themes raised in each meeting from notes taken by three different individuals at the three meetings.

A question that arose in the first meeting among ministers which carried through the following two conversations is. 'what is Conference?' It became clear in all three meetings that there are variations on what we mean by the term 'Conference'. Some referred to Conference as an annual event, others the State Office and others the relationship between Churches of Christ in SA & NT.

The Wednesday night group came up with a definition to describe the Conference of Churches of Christ in SA & NT. "Intentional relationships between churches under the banner of Churches of Christ, committed to each other and the Gospel with God working through us for the benefit of God's Kingdom." The definition was agreed to on the following evening and reflected the sentiment of what was expressed by the ministers. It was agreed that this was an aspirational description of Conference.

Our facilitator, Derek Linsell, instructed everyone to form cluster groups to discuss how we think we are currently reflecting this definition of Conference and to rate ourselves out of 10 in terms of effectiveness. The combined scores of both evening groups reflected an average score of 3.5 out of 10. Derek reflected that we have failed as a Conference to express this as our identity. He asked us to sit with the discomfort of that.

Reflections around the meetings resonated with a sense of disconnect from each other and the State Office. It was reflected that churches only relate to the State Office when they want or need something, usually in a time of distress. Reflections were shared about our sense of autonomy as a movement of churches expressing themselves in different ways. The language often used in this context was to talk about independent or individual churches. This is a shift even further away from autonomy, which is about being an association of churches working together yet expressed locally in different ways, to each church seeing themselves as independent churches with no need to relate to the association.

We have an aspirational belief that the Conference (as defined) enables churches to do ministry, outreach and care through resourcing and relationships, but that's not actually what occurs. In all three meetings the term 'we can't do this on our own' was expressed a number of times.

State Office to members of churches, and between churches; lack of compassion; lack of awareness; fractured relationships; we've lost our will to work together; we've become lazy in our conversations with each other; we feel isolated from one another; we don't work together. The vote not to endorse the reappointment of the State Minister was raised as an example of our lack of relationship with each other because many people were shocked at the outcome.

Comments were made in each meeting about our assumed theological differences or different understandings of the Gospel. While it was recognized that it is part of our DNA to allow a diversity of theological opinion and interpretation in the spirit of unity and love, it appears this is problematic because we don't really relate to each other or talk about our difference or celebrate our common unity. This is a conversation flagged for further exploration.

While many found the meetings uncomfortable, people expressed a sense of celebration that so

many people from so many churches came together. There were opportunities to listen to each other and catch up with each other afterwards.

In each meeting Derek reminded everyone that the objective of these meetings was not to come up with solutions but to become aware of the problem and sit with the discomfort and pain of what we are discovering together. He said we can't move forward unless we understand where we are now and work from there.

The team leading the review is now reflecting on the information gathered from the three meetings and will initiate the next phase of responding to a way forward together.
