

Learning more of the story that's formed us

I began this intentional journey of formation thinking that my reason for pursuing theological study was to deepen my 'head knowledge' and build an intellectual foundation from which to converse, teach and minister. 'Story of the Church' was one such subject that I thought would fill the head but leave my heart wanting. However, as the journey through history unfolded, I felt deep stirrings within my soul like never before.

Through allowing myself to see our Christian story in its entirety, I found deep companionship and inspiration in those that have walked before me. People who truly know the struggle of the Christian journey and that deep sense of conviction when we hear God speak into our hearts. History revealed moments of incredible joy and celebration, persecution and hopelessness and times when the sin of self-centeredness clouded an authentic response to Christ's call. I came to understand that as we embrace history as a whole, we embrace an encounter with God in all its fullness. A God who is not just present in the 'good bits' but is there in the struggle, in our failings, in our sin.

comes deep spiritual and theological significance in acknowledging the importance of the whole journey, the whole metanarrative. In learning the stories of different people who have sought to follow Christ and be his disciples through different cultures and periods of history, we begin to understand the story of salvation - God's redemption, forgiveness and transformation of sinful humans.

Learning the history of our story reveals a deeper insight into God's faithfulness, the struggle of discipleship, a remembering of those moments when we felt lost and yet somehow we were raised from the cross of utter hopelessness. Not knowing the complete history of our Christian story is like meeting someone as a young child and then reconnecting with them at the end of their life. What has happened that has impacted their view of God, their practice of faith, their overarching perspective of life? How will we understand the person we now engage with if we do not take the time to listen to their story?

As we allow ourselves the opportunity to listen to the whole of the Christian story we learn more of the faithfulness, power, compassion, humanity and divinity of God. And, as we learn of our Creator, we learn of our own identity, who we really are in Christ. How then, can the study of history be purely intellectual? Rather, when we are willing to face truth in all its vulnerability, rawness, tears, and celebrations we begin to perceive God and the community of the Body of Christ from all the ages, bigger than we can ever imagine. We allow God to speak to us and minister to us through testimonies of those who have walked before us, and to transform our hearts, minds and souls in ways we could never fathom.

Together may we seek to learn more of the story that has formed us. May we hear the ancient voices of the Desert Fathers and Mothers whisper their words of wisdom from the caves of their inner struggle. May we hear the cries and smell the burning flesh of those who have suffered and been martyred for their convictions, may our hearts break and learn from the atrocities that Christian's have committed upon those of other faiths and each other. May we be truly inspired by the actions of people such as William Wilberforce, Lord Shaftesbury, John Wesley and Martin Luther King Jr. who have sought to break the chains of oppression and bring God's transforming love and liberty to all classes and races. May we stand with unbelievers in the marketplace listening to the passion and evangelical sermons of John Whitefield and the Wesley's and, as Charles Spurgeon proclaims, may our hearts be stirred by the flames of revival, groaning, "O Lord, revive, thy work." As we gather in our churches of today may our spirits cry "Amazing Grace how sweet the sound, that saved a

wretch like me. I once was lost but now am found, was blind but now I see."

Here's an introduction to Alan ... in his own words.

My parents were missionaries on the aboriginal lands in Central Australia and Kimberley region.

I was raised on a scrub block west of Keith, in the Upper South East. At fifteen, I came to the City to continue my schooling and at sixteen became a member of the Hawthorn Church of Christ. I trained as a teacher and on my marriage to Margaret (Eagle) we attended Flinders Park Church of Christ. This was followed by a time at Naracoorte where I was Secretary to the South East Conference.

Since 1982 we have been members of Blackwood Church of Christ, fulfilling many leadership roles.

Most of my working career has been as a School Principal or District Superintendent of Education.

In 2002 – 2004 I worked as deputy team leader in a major AusAid project in Flores, Indonesia, building the capacity of educational leaders in basic education in a very remote area. (The 300 schools had neither water nor

electricity.) We have also worked in Samoa. We continue to mentor key Christian leaders in both countries.



On retirement I spent ten years conducting bus tours around Australia for Seniors which led me into my current role of deputy Chair of Life Care.

What do I bring to the role?

- * I am a lay person who has a strong faith in Christ as my Saviour. I believe we are here to fulfil His Commission.
- * As Christians I believe we need to support each other and share our journeys. Where appropriate we need to pool our resources for the common good of the Movement.
- * Leadership and support for our young people is critical in building healthy contemporary churches in a time when people are seeking spiritual growth and understanding.
- * Through my work I have had to be strategic in working with communities to develop current models of educational delivery and implement changes to ensure sustainability.
- * I am positive, optimistic and keen to work with others who feel convicted to follow in the steps of Christ.


It is a good thing when you can pray for someone. It not only calls on God to be active in their situation, but it has an effect on us, the people praying.
